Job Description:

- Deliver American Heart Association (AHA) Basic Life Support (BLS) and Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support (ACLS) courses to undergraduate medical, nursing students and external participants.
- Facilitate interactive lectures and skills practice in alignment with AHA guidelines.
- Prepare students for competency-based assessments by providing structured feedback and remediation.
- Ensure consistent application of AHA course objectives, policies, and teaching methodologies.
- Coordinate with the Medical Skills and Simulation Center and Training Center Coordinator (TCC) for scheduling, course logistics, and certification processes.
- Provide guidance to students on ethical practices and team communication during resuscitation.
- Document course attendance, student performance, and outcomes.
- Participate in ITC instructor meetings, and instructor updates to align with evolving educational needs.
- Collaborate with other instructors to integrate BLS and ACLS skills into clinical and preclinical coursework.
- Ensure a safe, supportive, and professional learning environment that fosters student engagement.

- Course Delivery:
- o BLS Provider Course: 4–5 hours per session (approximately 15 sessions for Medical students and 10 sessions for Nursing students)
- o ACLS Provider Course: 12–14 hours (typically over 2 days, approximately 13 sessions for Medical students)
- Academic-Year Commitment:
- Flexible based on academic calendar.
- o Typically, 72 hours/month of direct instruction during training periods.
- o Must be available to supervise scheduled students' community outreach activities and external courses/activities
